Royal United Hospital is setting out to become an NHS Foundation Trust hospital

On Monday 21st March the RUH begins a series of public meetings across Bath, North East Somerset, Wiltshire, Somerset (Mendip)and South Gloucestershire, This consultation will last 13 weeks, offering the public, patients and staff the opportunity to find out more about the plans and to become members of the new NHS Foundation Trust.

As an NHS Foundation Trust, the RUH will be able to recruit members from our staff, patients and the local community and these members then have a say in how the hospital is run and the services it provides. One of the most important aspects of being an NHS FT is our accountability to the population we serve through that membership. Members can choose how involved they want to be, including standing for election as one of our Governors.

Brian Stables, the Trust's Chairman says: "We are a successful hospital and have made tremendous improvements in our standards of quality and care and managing our money. We'll continue to focus on our core services – providing acute and urgent care but becoming an NHS Foundation Trust means we will also have greater freedom to build on our achievements and more control over how we invest money in patient care. By signing up as a member of our NHS Foundation Trust hospital, local people can directly influence the future of the services we offer here at the RUH.

Over the next 13 weeks we will be carrying out a major consultation with the public about our plans and I would urge everyone to come along and find out more. Becoming a member is the best way to get involved in the work of the RUH and make your voice heard."

The public meetings about the plans will be advertised on the RUH website, <u>www.ruh.nhs.uk</u>, from Monday and details are also printed in our Consultation booklets available from outpatient departments and the Information desk in the Atrium at the RUH.

Membership is free, and open to those aged over 16 who live in Bath, North East Somerset, Wiltshire, Mendip, or South Gloucestershire or the rest of England and Wales.

Notes to Editors

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1. NHS Foundation Trusts are individual organisations which are still an integral part of the NHS, but based on the concept of mutual organisations or cooperative societies. They have members who are representative of local communities and staff.

2. NHS Foundation Trusts are:

- free from Department of Health and Strategic Health Authority control
- duty-bound to deliver free care based on need, not ability to pay
- locally accountable to their members who are drawn from staff, patients and the local community
- more accountable to patients, staff and the public.
