If you don't feel well and you need to stay in hospital, we want to make sure that your stay is as nice as possible.

What to expect


Sometimes you will sleep in a room by yourself, but most people share a bay with other people.

The doctors and nurses looking after you will probably be both men and women.














The toilet and bathroom will be close to your bed so you can get to them easily.

If you are a man, you will share a toilet or bathroom only with other men.









We want to make sure that men and women do not have to share the same room in hospital, which will make your stay nicer.



Most people will share a room with less than six beds. This is called a bay.



A hospital ward can be made up of a number of bays.



If you are a woman you will share a bay only with other women.







If you are a man you will share a bay only with other men.

Hospitals may have a room that some men and women can use during the day to eat or relax.



When do men and women have to share?

If we need to care for you very quickly, or you need specialist care and/or equipment, you might have to share with men and women.

But we will tell you before we do this and try to move you as quickly as we can back to a single sex area.
