Primary Care Referral Pathways to Rheumatology Services at RNHRD

Suspected Gout

Key message: Most cases of Gout can be managed in primary care

Referral to a Specialist Rheumatologist is recommended if:

Polyarticular disease (>1 joint)

Uncertainty regarding diagnosis

Presence of progressive joint damage (clinically or radiologically)

Difficulty establishing or maintaining disease control

Suggested investigations

Urate CRP

PV

FBC

U&E, Creat, LFTs

RF

Lipids (including Triglycerides)
Xrays hands and feet

DO NOT DELAY REFERRAL IF BLOOD TESTS ARE NORMAL Urate can be normal in acute gout

Persistent symptoms can lead to progressive joint damage

Please include in referral letter:

Symptom duration

Number of attacks per year

Risk factors eg alcohol, diuretics, renal disease, family history

Presence of tophi

Significant PMH and medication history
