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## **RUH Professor wins Great Briton 2008**

A surgeon at the Royal United Hospital, Bath, has been voted one of the Great Britons of 2008.

Last November Professor Martin Birchall worked with doctors in Barcelona to create and transplant the first whole organ to be grown from a patients own stem cells.

For Claudia Castillo, the 30-year-old mother of two whose windpipe was replaced with the laboratory grown tissue, it meant regaining the ability to read stories to her children and enjoying long walks in the park.

Professor Birchall's award is even more impressive considering the candidates in the science and technology category last year, which included the team behind the Large Hadron Collider.

The Daily Telegraph, whose expert panel nominates men and women who have excelled in every field from politics to science and technology for their annual awards, said Professor Birchall "has heralded a new era in medical science."

Medical Director of the RUH, John Waldron, said "We're all extremely proud of Martin's achievements and his contribution to the RUH has been invaluable. To be honoured in this way demonstrates the importance of the work that Martin and other groundbreaking surgeons in the UK are involved with. We really are at the forefront of medical science, developing world class procedures that will improve patient care immeasurably."

Professor Birchall is to take up the position of Professor of Laryngology at Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital in London and is also chair of Ear Nose and Throat (ENT) surgery at the University of Bristol. He leads the largest ENT research group in the UK (the Laryngeal Research Group), which is focusing on understanding the immune system of the throat with the aim of developing newer and better treatments for throat diseases.

- On returning to the UK, Martin worked as Senior Lecturer to Professor John Farndon at the University of Bristol, before taking a Chair in Head and Neck Surgery at the University of Liverpool. In 2005, he was appointed to the Chair of ENT in Bristol.
