



Post Procedure Advice

After your investigation

- Do not eat or drink for 30 minutes after the throat spray.
- For the next **24 hours** everything you eat, or drink should be cooled and not too hot.
- You may continue your normal medications. However, if you have been advised to stop a blood thinning medication, a nurse will let you know before you leave when it is safe to start taking it again.

If you have had sedation, for the following 24 hours:


- You cannot legally drive.
- You must not use or operate machinery and electrical appliances.
- You must not drink alcohol.
- You should not sign any important documents or papers that you may not want to agree to at a later time.
- You must not look after anyone who needs your help to manage, such as young children or older members of the family.
- You must have someone to supervise you at home and accompany you during your discharge from the hospital.

Nose Bleed (epistaxis) is not unusual after having a trans-nasal endoscopy. We recommend:

- 1. Sit up with your head tilted forward. This is to prevent blood being swallowed.
- 2. Pinch the soft part of your nose (below the hard nasal bones) between thumb and forefinger for at least 10 minutes without letting go.
- 3. Place an icepack on the bridge of your nose or sit in a cool aired room.
- 4. If after 30 minutes bleeding persists, go to an emergency department.

Once the bleeding has stopped:

- 1. Rest and avoid vigorous activity such as exercise.
- 2. Avoid stooping, bending and lifting heavy weights.
- 3. Avoid blowing your nose vigorously. If needed, blow gently through one nostril at a time.
- 4. Open your mouth if you need to sneeze.
- 5. Avoid smoky atmospheres, alcohol and hot spicy foods for 48 72 hours.



You may experience:

- Slight abdominal (tummy) discomfort immediately following the procedure due to the air introduced. This can be relieved by moving around, passing wind or warm drinks when you are able to.
- A mild sore throat which usually resolves within 24 hours, taking throat lozenges can help.

Follow Up:

- Your results will be discussed with you before you are discharged, and a copy of the report is usually provided.
- If biopsies have been taken, you will be informed with the results either at your outpatient appointment, or in a letter. We will also let your GP know by giving them a copy of the letter.

Please <u>seek medical help straight away</u> if you develop any of the following symptoms:

- Severe pain and/or vomiting.
- Rectal (back passage) bleeding, black tarry stools or vomiting blood.
- A high temperature and/or 'flu like' symptoms.
- Redness, pain and/or swelling at the site where you had a cannula if you had sedation.
- Persistent and/or worsening nose bleeds.
